### Cruise Leader Guide Lines





#### Cruise Leader(s) Guidelines

#### General

- You are representing Offshore Salling School and, as such, need to show exemplary moral, social and leadership standards along with exceptional seamanship and trouble-shooting skills. There should be no "fratemization" with participants.
- Set and maintain standards that are outlined in the cruise manual, such as no smoking below, no drinking alcoholic beverages underway, etc.
- 3. You are responsible to keep the boats together and in working order. This may mean unclogging heads, if the crew is unwilling or unable to do it. You should be the only contact with the charter company. The reason we have assigned skippers is not necessarily because one person is more experienced, but when speaking to the charter company, we want only one spokesman speaking for any of the crew and that person is the Offshore Cruise Leader.
- 4. Familiarize yourself with every aspect of the cruise booklet for your trip. The others have it and may or may not read it. However, if you have to talk to a crew about what they are doing, you probably have portions of the manual to back you up.
- 5. Remember, the first day people have had a long and tiring plane trip, they are anxious about their salling abilities, and they are still wound up from work. It takes them a day or two to get into the swing of things, to relax, and to build confidence. For the cruise leader, the first two days are tough and need constant attention. After that it becomes delightful.
- 6. When a cruise leader has the privilege and pleasure of bringing along a spouse or another person, that person is also considered a working partner. Quite often it is easiest to split up the social and gathering tasks (setting up the welcome party and get-togethers during the cruise, taking pictures) versus operational (making sure the boats are all in good shape before you leave and operationally sound throughout the cruise).

#### On arrival - first night:

 Make your travel plans to get there shead of the group. Check-in with the charter company and make sure all is in order, including room reservations, if any, (give them the roommate list), the names of the boats we'll be using, when to board

- the next day and other details you'll need to tell participants such as navigation and boat check out times.
- 2. Greet arriving participants and make them feel comfortable. A cruise meeting for all participants should takes place before the charter boat check-in to reliterate and emphasize the information received in their booklet. Usually this is scheduled in advance and part of the package paid by all participants and held the evening before the cruise starts. Whether or not the drinks are free should have been seelled out in advance, so make sure you know before the party starts.
- 3. Special attention should be called to the fact this is a group cruise of the Offshore Crulsing Club. Ask that they don't inclividually talk to charter company base personnel about what salling experience they may or may not have. Also, make the point that we have chartered the boats and, since we are responsible for them, we must have everybody in the same harbor every night. If they want to go off on their own, then they must charter direct in the future.
- Reliterate what is not included in the cruise package such as fuel and water during the cruise, beverages, meals ashore, mooring and dock fees, etc.
- Explain use of the VHF. Chatter is to be limited. Each skipper should call the cruise leader first if there's a maintenance problem to see if it can be solved and the cruise leader will then call the charter company if necessary. Any calls to the base should be by the cruise leader.
- 6. The security deposit, if any, will be shared by all. Let's say there is a \$3000 security deposit per boat with five participants per boat and four boats. Let's say one boat does \$1000 damage on the cruise. Instead of the five paying \$200 apiece, the 20 participants pay \$50 each. Explain "we're all in this together" and damage to a boat is never intentional. At the higher exposure, the five will be playing the "blame game" with terrible consequences.
- 7. Always discuss dinghles. Each boat should assign a dally dinghy captain in charge of securing the dinghy for towing, anchoring/docking, at dinghy dock and when tied to the boat for the night. Dinghy painters should always be cleated with a locking turn and the bitter end should be tied with a bowline to a suitable fitting on the yacht. Engines should be tested before leaving the charter dock, and outboards should have a safety line attaching them to the dinghy.

#### Daily:

- 1. Before leaving the anchorage each moming, dinghy around to every boat in the group. Go aboard and review the schedule of the day, the final anchorage, any navigational concerns or dangers to avoid, estimated time of arrival, where you plan to eat sahore if it's a restaurant night, what main course they want if the restaurant has requested we give them this information in advance, and ask if there are any problems on the boat.
- 2. Make restaurant reservations for the flotilia when scheduled.
